Year In Review:

2019 Pro-Choice Victories

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This timeline tallies pro-choice victories in the year 2019. It includes political and social successes, favourable court rulings and Ad Standards decisions, and anti-choice losses. Thank you to everyone who contributes to the daily fight for abortion rights and access!

January

22nd: An Alberta judge <u>banned</u> the extremist anti-choice group Canadian Centre for Bio-ethical Reform from protesting inside the Calgary airport.

March

❖ 19th: The Ontario Coalition for Abortion Clinics and Humanist Canada <u>launched</u> the Dr. Henry Morgentaler Memorial Scholarship. This \$1000 scholarship will help physicians train to provide abortion services in Canada.

April

- 4th: Anti-choice ads were <u>removed</u> from Grand River Transit buses in Waterloo. The ads falsely claimed that abortion is linked to suicide, substance abuse, breast cancer, depression, and infertility.
- * 8th: The Women's Legal Education and Action Fund (LEAF) in Halifax <u>published</u> a guide to abortion access in Nova Scotia: "Access to Choice".
- * 8th: Calgary's City Council <u>passed</u> a motion to explore whether Calgary has the power to set up safe zones to keep protesters with graphic materials away from children at schools.
- 16th: Health Canada <u>approved</u> updates for the prescribing of Mifegymiso, the abortion pill. Ultrasounds are no longer required.
- 29th: Clinic 554 in Fredericton New Brunswick <u>won</u> the 2019 Peter Gillespie Social Justice Award for its care and dedication to marginalised communities.

May

- * 15th: The Court of Appeal for Ontario <u>ruled</u> that doctors who object to providing care for religious or personal reasons must offer patients an "effective referral" for services they oppose.
- 22nd: The City of Nelson, BC, ended the courtesy banner programme due to a "Right to Life" banner that violated Charter rights. (A qualified win because human rights groups such Kootenay Pride will not be able to fly their flag.)
- 24th: The Thames Valley District school board <u>nixed</u> a religious group's anti-sex and anti-abortion talk at an elementary school in London, Ontario, after a backlash from parents.

June

- 1st: Manitoba announced that it would provide full coverage for the abortion pill Mifegymiso.
- 4th: Prime Minister Justin Trudeau <u>increased</u> funding for global women's health to \$1.4 billion annually for 10 years, making the announcement at the global Women Deliver conference held in Vancouver. The funding will cover sexual and reproductive health, including safe abortion.
- 5th: The Northwest Territories <u>began</u> fully covering the cost of Mifegymiso for everyone.

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- * 7th: Saskatchewan <u>announced</u> full coverage of Mifegymiso, the last province to do so. All provinces and territories now fully fund the abortion pill except Nunavut, which funds it for about 90% of residents.
- * 13th: An anti-choice billboard was <u>taken down</u> in Kelowna because Ad Standards said it was inaccurate and demeaning to women by implying they can have abortions up to the 9th month of pregnancy.
- 19th: The SHORE Centre in Kitchener <u>launched</u> the national app "Choice Connect" to help folks find an abortion provider in their area based on their individual needs.
- ❖ 19th: Globe and Mail journalist Carly Weeks <u>received</u> the Society of Obstetricians and Gynecologists of Canada's Journalism Award for Excellence in Women's Health reporting. In particular, she was awarded for her coverage about Mifegymiso coverage in Canada.

July

Numerous Canadians <u>protested</u> and <u>boycotted</u> Cineplex and Landmark Cinemas in response to their showing of the anti-choice film Unplanned. Widespread media coverage <u>exposed</u> the film as false and harmful propaganda.

August

21st: Ontario's new sex education curriculum was <u>released</u>, and it retained most elements of the previous Liberal government curriculum that had been repealed by Doug Ford in response to right-wing protests, including sexual orientation, gender identity, and consent.

September

* 19th: ARCC launched a federal <u>election toolkit</u>, including voting guides, questions for candidates, and much more. (We are grateful to UNIFOR for their donation to help us produce this valuable resource.)

October

- ❖ 10th: Although Clinic 554 in Fredericton <u>announced</u> its impending closure on this day, it resulted in significant national media attention and forced party leaders to take a stand during the election campaign. Green Party leader Elizabeth May <u>attended</u> an Oct 11 Fredericton rally to support the clinic, Jagmeet Singh <u>promised</u> to save the clinic, and Justin Trudeau <u>promised</u> to meet with the Premier. On Oct 24th, Horizon Health threw its support behind Clinic 554.
- 21st: The Conservative Party led by Andrew Scheer <u>lost</u> the federal election. Subsequent media narrative <u>blamed</u> Scheer's inability to clarify that his right-wing views on abortion and LGBTQI2S+ issues would not affect his government's agenda.

November

- 15th: The 2019 Helen and Fred Bentley awards for Excellence were <u>awarded</u> to SHORE Centre, a sexual health centre in Kitchener (first place); and Planned Parenthood Newfoundland and Labrador (second place).
- 23rd: Bill 207, Alberta's regressive "conscience rights" bill that would guarantee complete immunity for physicians who refuse to provide care for personal reasons, was <u>voted down</u> by the committee in charge of private member's business. (Alberta's Parliament will still vote on it.)
- 23rd: Pro-choice group Rocks for Kocs began placing pro-choice rocks on an "unborn" memorial stone in St. James Cemetery in Belleville, Ontario, continuing into 2020.

December

- ❖ 1st: Nova Scotia pharmacists were granted the go-ahead to prescribe birth control.
- ❖ 17th: The NDP in Nova Scotia <u>announced</u> it will introduce legislation to establish a safe access zone to prevent harassment of people seeking abortion services at the Women's Choice Clinic in Halifax.

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
